In December our good friend, Rev. Father Chad Ripperger, FSSP, gave us a most inspiring and uplifting Retreat. After our annual Retreat, we focused on Advent and preparing for Christmas. We believe it was most fitting that we had our first Christmas in a "Bethlehem" environment.

On January 1, 2013 - to start off the year we welcomed the monks to our new parlor for the annual "St. Benedict – St. Scholastica meeting," i.e., recreation. It was a wonderful gathering – something we look forward to with much joy each year.

Before we knew it, it was the annual Work Day at Clear Creek. It was a cold, windy Oklahoma winter day, even though it was on March 2, 2013. It was appropriate that we had a big, roaring fire going all day – the young men kept the fire burning by vigilantly feeding it with large logs. Thus, our many volunteers could warm themselves by the fire periodically and during lunch. So many chores were accomplished in a day due to the hard work by friends from around Clear Creek and also from Tulsa and yes, from Lincoln, Nebraska and Dallas, Texas. 
2012 Nativity Scene
